He's How Old?

Walter Breuning of Great Falls Montana, who is 112, downplayed being the oldest man in the world Sunday (July 19) after 113-year-old Henry Allingham of England died Saturday, but others paused to acknowledge the milestone. Mr. Breuning is both a Mason and a Shriner.

Breuning became interested in Masonry as a young man in Minnesota. "I was walking home one evening and saw a lighted sign on a building which referred to the Masons," he explained. "At that time I decided to join the organization some day."

He became a member of the Great Falls Lodge No. 118 in 1925 and served as Worshipful Master in 1934. He was Lodge Secretary for 25 years, from 1945 to 1970. Since joining the Scottish Rite in 1937, he has served on various committees, including Director of Work, from 1940 to 1985. Breuning served as Venerable Master in 1950, received the Knight Commander Court of Honour in 1949, and was coroneted a 33° Inspector General Honorary in 1958.

He became a member of Algeria Shriners in Helena, Montana, in 1951. "I was a very good friend of a fellow Mason named Hugh Sutherland, who was the Potentate of Algeria Shrine Temple," he said. "He encouraged me to join."

Breuning managed the Elbon Shrine Club in the basement of the Rainbow Hotel in Great Falls for 15 years, until the age of 99. He is a member of the Royal Order of Scotland and a recipient of the DeMolay Honorary Legion of Honour.

Now we can say the oldest man in the world is our Brother! Pretty neat I think! You can learn more about this good Brother by searching the internet.

On This Day in History

The first active 'Résistant' shot during the Second World War by the German authorities was a Freemason. Brother José Roig was executed at Ivry, August 1st 1941, for supporting, and recruiting for, General de Gaulle and the Free French Government in exile.

The French Government's Act of August 13th 1940, which proscribed Freemasonry, led to the dismissal of all Freemasons serving in the Civil Service, Local Government and Teaching. Naturally, this caused much resentment against the Vichy Government and their masters, the occupying Nazi forces. This resentment, coupled with the ideals of Freemasonry - of liberty of speech and thought - could easily be channelled into both active and passive resistance. Furthermore, Freemasonry, with its implicit trust in fellow Masons, was already organised into Lodges and 'Triangles' of three Brethren (according to French Masonic practice), and was thus ideally suited for clandestine activities.

In addition, many Freemasons had served in the Armed Forces and had returned to civilian life disillusioned with the French authorities. They felt that the unthinkable collapse of France was the result of poor strategy by the leaders and the low morale of the troops. They were eager to redeem the reputation of France, by combating the oppressive measures of Vichy and the occupying power. Their specialised knowledge was very useful in intelligence gathering, and organising networks and the necessary administration.

As the Occupation continued, Freemasons were to be found in almost all the main Resistance networks: Libération, Combat, Franc-Tireur, Marco Polo, Coq Enchâiné, Comète, Atelier de la Bastille, La Bonne Foi and many others.

Ancient Egyptian Obelisks

Late in the 19th Century, the Government of Egypt divided a pair of obelisks between the United States of America and Great Britain. One stands in Central Park, New York City, and the other on the Thames Embankment in London. Although they are commonly known as Cleopatra's Needles, they have no historical connection with the Egyptian Queen.

These obelisks were erected and dedicated at Heliopolis by Thutmose III about 1500 BC (*Ed: all indicated dates are arguable depending on who you believe*) and bear inscriptions to him and to Rameses II. The inscriptions to Rameses II must have been added later as his dynasty was circa 1304-1237 BC. They were carved from the typical red granite found in the Aswan quarries and stand 21.2 metres, (69 ft 6 in) high, and have a rectangular base that is 2.36 metres (7 ft 9 in) by 2.34 metres (7 ft 8 in). Each weighs 180 tons. They were later moved and re-erected in the ancient city of Alexandria where they remained until 22 BC.

Obelisks are known to have been erected as early as the 4th Egyptian Dynasty (~2675-2500 BC); however, no examples from that era have survived. The earliest surviving examples date from the 12th Dynasty (1991-1786 BC) and stand outside the Temple of Amen at Karnack. One pair erected by Thutmose III (1479-1425 BC) are 24 metres (80 ft) high, 1.8 metres (6 ft) square at the base and weigh 143 tons each.

During the time of the Roman Emperors, many obelisks were transported from Egypt to what is now Italy. At least a dozen went to the city of Rome itself, including one now in the Piazza San Giovanni in Laterano, that was originally erected by Thutmose III, who reigned from 1479-1425 BC (18th Dynasty)



at Karnack. With a height of 32 metres (105 feet) and a square base with sides of 2.7 metres (9 ft), and tapering to a square top with sides of 1.88 meters (6 ft 2 in), it weighs approximately 230 tons and is the largest existing ancient obelisk.

All of these ancient obelisks were cut from a single shaft of stone, usually red granite from the quarries at Aswan. They are an historic tribute to the great technical and mechanical genius of the ancient Egyptians in not only preparing the stones from the quarries but also in transporting them in one piece and in setting them up on their proper bases. The sides were inscribed with hieroglyphs usually indicating a religious and commemorative purpose.

Of interest to us as Freemasons, is the fact that in the base of the Cleopatra's Needles obelisks, were discovered, cemented within their bases, a trowel, a lead plummet, a pure white stone, a rectangular stone rough on its upper and lower surfaces, and a recessed stone clearly showing the oblong square. Remember that these were transported from Egypt late in the 19th century to England and the USA otherwise these symbols may have remained hidden from us. The explanation of the First Tracing Board commences with the statement, "The usages and customs of Freemasonry have ever borne a near affinity to those of the ancient Egyptians". There is today absolutely no doubt that the ancient Egyptians were monotheists and had a ritual for Initiation and higher degrees of learning. They possessed what is termed "The Great Wisdom", which was a complete philosophy based on absolute knowledge of Nature and of Man. It was demonstrated step by step by a science, equally exact, embodied in religious symbolism and allegory. Over time, this great knowledge became clouded, then degraded, and finally lost to the world through ambition, pride, treachery and bigotry of men, so that it no longer exists today in an orderly form. But the ancient knowledge based on SYMBOLISM does remain and has never been lost, though there are many who still deny that it ever existed. This is one of the Great Ancient Treasures of Wisdom, which we as Freemasons are privileged, in varying degrees, to be instructed in and to which we sometimes hear referred to irreverently by the ignorant, the bigoted and the uninitiated.
