Grand Master's Reception:

The five Toronto Districts celebrated our Grand Master's tenure of office with a reception on Tuesday March 29th. Over 550 masons and friends attended in what has been described as the best reception for the Grand Master so far in this jurisdiction.

Toronto East sold 106 tickets for the event. 19 Masters and Immediate Past Masters registered for the event. A total of 35 Masters and 14 IPM from the 5 districts were in attendance. W. Bro. Prince Selvaraj gave the Toast to the Queen and the Craft and I gave the Toast to the Visitors.

I would like to thank all our brethren and their guests for their attendance and V.W. Bro. Ed Russell, our Ticket Coordinator for taking on this task.

The 5 Toronto Districts presented a cheque for \$4,000 to the Grand Master for his project.

Official Visits:

We had 4 Official Visits in April. I continued my talks on the symbols of the Entered Apprentice Degree. At Markham Union I started my series on the Fellowcraft Degree symbols which I will continue this month.

Long Range Planning:

The District Long Range Planning Committee held its inaugural meeting and it was free flowing with many ideas. At the following meetings the Committee will be using some of these ideas to start making a plan, determine mission and vision statements, goals etc. and agree on a general approach for implementing a District Long Range Plan.

District Workshops:

The workshops on **Improving your Proficiency in the Mechanics of the Work and Officer Progression Workshop** were a huge success with 60 masons in attendance and were beyond all my expectations. The G.L. Chairman, LoI (Lodge of Instruction) indicated that this was the largest attendance his team has ever had for this workshop. "Toronto East far exceeded our expectations in attracting an unusually high number of Worshipful Masters, current Lodge Officers, and Master Masons to this event. (75% of the attendees fell into this category.) If only this would happen at every District Workshop!" My only regret was that only 5 Masters attended. Was it because the other 14 knew it all?

The District Mentor Chairman will be following up with a workshop on **Officer Progression** to help those line officers through their journey to the Master's chair. It will be held on Saturday May 7th from 8:30 am - 12 noon at the Doric Temple.

A **Computer Resources and Secretaries' Seminar** will be held on Saturday June 11th at the Doric Temple from 8:30 am - 2:00 pm. This seminar is for Masters, Secretaries, Treasurers and other interested masons. The seminar will be conducted by the Grand Secretary, M.W. Bro. Terence Shand and V.W. Bro. Robert Kliaman. More information will be forthcoming.

Our **Spring District Business Meeting** was held on Saturday April 30 at the East Toronto Masonic Temple, Chisholm Ave. Reports were given by District Chairmen and me on our various portfolios for the year under review.

Toronto East Masonic Centre (T.E.M.C.)

Over the past month I've continued to meet and speak with many people in the district and across the jurisdiction with respect to building the new temple for Toronto East District to ensure our growth and success. This is a critical juncture in the district's history, as we act now for all brothers past, present and future. I do not believe we are simply in the process of buying a piece of land, but in fact building our next home for Freemasonry, and a facility that will welcome the community proudly and with intent, locally and from around the world.



Upon completion, men and women will be attracted to our welcoming museum, library, gallery and interactive displays, as well as our day-time meeting spaces and our professional suites on the second floor (doctors, dentists, accountants, lawyers, etc) before moving through the private “members only” third floor and onto the rooftop patio to enjoy the solarium and observatory.

We all know and appreciate there is a limited budget to achieve our self-sustaining vision, yet we’re creatively trying to think outside the box, while ensuring our bases are covered financially. Be assured, I am also looking at various financing vehicles as well. In this respect, there are options to consider for the sale of East Toronto Temple, in order to maximize that asset, while also acquiring other possible strategic partners that are appropriate going forward, in addition to suppliers. There is the element to consider of financing the new structure through a bond issue, in addition to an array of non-debt fundraising activities. These conversations need to begin somewhere and I am happy to report they are happening now.

With this in mind, at the next meeting on April 28, at 7:30, I have invited a special guest to address our board: Bro Matt Popow. He is employed at a firm called Devoncore NKF, which is a large corporation that assists head offices create and ultimately execute a real estate strategy. Similarly to seeking objective opinions in the realm of legal and accounting, I think it would be prudent for the board to understand their options related to this forthcoming real estate transaction and development project, notwithstanding the eventual management of the on-going operation.

At the moment, given the recently unveiled Strategic Plan, the leaders of our Craft acknowledge a tremendous resurgence of interest in our lodges, especially within urban centres, in particular Toronto, and look forward to new lodges forming to accommodate an influx of new members. The new temple will feature on its third floor two lodge rooms, as well as adjacent facilities, and a post-lodge festive board room. We must guard the West Gate well, but we must also attract the best possible candidates, and with the new temple we have that opportunity.

I have prepared an agenda for the next meeting, which is being circulated to the members, and under Other Business hope to leave the board pondering the possibilities after showing them an array of pen and ink sketches of the front entranceway, meeting rooms, professional suites and glass-encased solarium and maybe the billiards room in the basement. I’ve heard a lot of great ideas, and welcome them all.

Soon, however, decisions will be made by the board to provide direction to the executive officers to act and, prior to that, each Primary will receive a copy of the business plan, which will outline how we will spend our money and how we will recoup it over time, while providing a permanent home for Freemasonry in Toronto East, and one that will help ensure the growth and success of the Craft in our district and across the world, as a beacon of hope.

Sankey Lecture Series

At the latest Sankey lecture, held on March 20 2011 featured speaker Dr. Jessica Hartland-Jacobs talking on Fraternalism and the Effects of Freemasonry on Society as it Spread Through the British Empire, several items of interest were announced.

- M.W. Bro. Raymond S. J. Daniels made it very clear that Freemasonry is an Educational Institution. Our recent affiliation with Brock University is an example of how natural this association is. The Associate Dean of the University, Carol Merriam, confirmed the great association that now exists between the University and the Grand Lodge of Canada in the Province of Ontario. In academic



circles, Brock University now houses the most extensive North American wide public library on Freemasonry.

Passed to the Grand Lodge Above

It is with great sadness that I must report that at the age of 114 Years and 205 Days, our Brother Walter Breuning was called to the Grand Lodge Above at 3 pm Thursday, April 14, 2011.

Brother Walter had been a Master Mason for 85 Years and 333 Days. He was also a proud member of the Scottish Rite and Shrine.

Brother Walter was Initiated on March 7, 1925, Passed on April 4, 1925 and Raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on May 16, 1925 in Great Falls Lodge #118, Great Falls, Montana. He served as Secretary of Great Falls Lodge #118 from January 1, 1946 through December 31, 1968. He affiliated with Cascade Lodge #34, Great Falls, Montana on January 1, 1992. Bro. Breuning received the Meritorious Service Medal on June 24, 1993.

On September 21, 2010, the plainspoken Breuning turned 114 years old, remaining the oldest man in the world, according to the Gerontology Research Group. Brother Breuning was also verified as the fourth oldest person in the world. Brother Breuning was also the world's oldest Freemason.

Because I Am A Freemason

- I know that education, and the rational use of the mind, are the keys to facing the problems of humanity; therefore, I will bring my questions, and my ideas, to my Lodge, and strive to advance the growth of my mind alongside my brothers.
- I know that the rich tradition of freemasonry and its framework of Ritual are important platforms for growth and learning; therefore, I vow to stand upon these platforms, to improve myself as a human being, and I vow to help in the mission of the Craft to provide tools, atmosphere, challenges and motivation to help each brother do the same.
- I know that Charity is the distinguishing human virtue, and that personal community service is the best demonstration of one's commitment to humanity; I acknowledge that words without deeds are meaningless, and I vow to work with my Lodge to provide service to the community, and to promote charity, friendship, morality, harmony, integrity, fidelity and love.



- I know that my obligation to community extends beyond my local sphere and is partly fulfilled in the love of my country, obedience to its laws and celebration of the freedoms and opportunities it symbolizes.
- I know that leadership is best demonstrated by commitment to serving others; I will therefore participate in, and help work at improving individual leadership skills, and serve the Brothers of my Lodge to the best of my ability.
- I know that friendship, fidelity and family are the foundations of a well lived life; I therefore vow to be a faithful friend to my Brothers, as I expect my Lodge to respect my personal obligations, and to treat my family as though my family were their own.
- I know that the last great lesson in Freemasonry - the value of personal integrity and the sanctity of one's word - is a lesson for all people in all times; therefore I vow to be a man of my word.
- I know that Masonry's power is best exercised when its light is shared with the world at large; I therefore vow to bring the best of myself to my Lodge, in order that my growth might be fostered and nurtured, and to present myself to the World as a working Freemason, on the path to building a more perfect Temple.
- Because I am a Freemason these values and aspirations are guideposts for my progress through life!

Now, Here Is A Lodge In . . .



Nassau Bahamas

I stood out front of the Bahamian “RIU” Hotel waiting for Bro. Reiaich to drive up in his self described light blue Honda. Standing there waiting, I was tapped on the shoulder by another guest of the hotel asking, “Are you a Freemason?”

I proudly replied, “Yes I am” as I can only come to the conclusion it was either my ring or the Markham Union Lodge #87 boldly laid out across my golf shirt that gave him that idea..

He then began to tell me how he was excited that he had been asked to drop by Maple Lodge in Toronto for dinner and that he would be petitioning shortly after for membership, so he figured.



I replied that there is no bigger reward and all the typical answers that you get out what you put in etc., etc. and that I was on my way to the Nassau Masonic Hall for a visit and that this is what Freemasonry was all about, getting out and meeting others etc., etc. He smiled and alerted me to the fact that he “Could not wait and would someday be standing beside me as a Brother”; definitely setting the tone for the morning as new membership when deserved is always music to my ears.

Just then the blue Honda came into view and I hopped in. Brother Reiach is one of the nicest guys you will ever meet and extremely enlightened on the ways of the Craft so it was a drive I was truly looking forward to. As we chatted, the Masonic Hall came squarely into view - a 3 story yellow building with a great big white S&C positioned proudly in the centre. Norman pulled up to the Temple which I noticed has roughly 5 thriving successful businesses with one named “Solomon’s Mine Jewellery” as he explained that by the fortune of the Great Architect of the Universe and some crafty planning, this Temple was in great shape financially and a very unique position. You see, unlike most others, their success doesn’t necessarily depend on X number of new members each year as most of our typical Craft Lodges rely on that cycle of membership to merely exist. This building has a constant flow of cash, happy tenants and a strong historical heritage with ties all over the island.

As we came under the front awning and started to enter the building from the back entrance, he explained “easier Fire Escape.” I looked down and noticed that the sidewalk had a design on it that was made into the “Square and Compasses” layout, the only place in the city for this peculiar design to take place. ☺

Still examining the sidewalk, I heard the metal clash of two large gates opening with authority and then a proud mention “These are only temporary gates; we will replace them with our renovations shortly.” The renovation Brother Reiach was referring to is corresponds to the 175th year celebration that the members of this wonderful Royal Victoria Lodge #443 had decided to put on to provide some of their elder brethren the opportunity to celebrate making it that far and meeting in the same building where that Lodge had been consecrated 174 years prior. Under the United Grand Lodge of England, 200 years is the next celebration point and thus an “official” benchmark in a Lodges existence, but in my humble opinion, any Lodge that has met in the exact same building and the exact same spot for the last 175 years is worthy of as much celebration as they see fit. Quite an amazing feat indeed and something to envy and work towards in our own Mother Lodges.

As they realized that some of the elder brethren whom have contributed substantially may naturally run the risk of being in the Grand Celestial Lodge by the 200 year mark, 175 will also be a celebration in honour of all, and rightly so. What is fantastic about this is that by sheer fluke, the same week the District Grand Masters Conference for the Caribbean is taking place, which will see the DGMs from Bermuda, Bahamas, Jamaica, Barbados and Guyana in town and just to cap it all off the Pro. Grand Master and his Grand Secretary plan on attending, which will all take place in this Historical Nassau Temple. This is why the renovations were decided to be timed with this Grand Celebration and District Conference. What a perfect reason to upgrade.

Entering the Hall from the rear fire exit, you walk into a room with about 30 storage lockers just like in high school. This is for the senior brethren to use as storage for all of their regalia so they aren’t lugging it all back and forth as every Order in Nassau meet out of this Building. After this, you enter into an “L” run that has everything from display cases of older aprons and other regalia to pictures of every single Master since 1837!!!! As part of the renovations, they will be matching all of the picture frames to make a uniform layout. So much work to be done but I can’t wait to see it upon completion. Up on the right was the door to the Lodge which I entered and the lights were thrown on. At first, I could not believe what I was seeing but I can say it was a very unique and fitting room for this area of the world.



Spectacular is an under statement. As this was an “English” lodge room, a few things were immediately different, such as the IPM sits to the left of the Master and the altar was directly in front of the East and not in the middle of the floor. Oh yeah, where was the “Blazing Star” in the Mosaic Pavement? How come the only Officers on the “Level” were the Wardens? All of these questioned entered into my head. I decided not to ask as I used this as an excuse to do some more homework on the differences between what I was used to and the UGLE Lodge setup. As I sat in the Masters Chair and Bro. Reiach quickly offering to take a photo, it dawned on me, “I am sitting in the same chair which His Royal Highness the Duke of Windsor sat in when he was vacationing in the Bahamas to get out of the spotlight back in the Kingdom.

This Lodge is truly fantastic and gushing history, character and elegance. The seating/chairs for the visitors and brethren were setup as though it was the galley of an old English frigate in the 1800’s. The two Great Pillars stand on either side of you upon your entrance into the room. The lights in the middle of the room/ceiling were inter-laid in the blue sky canvass and with the flip of a switch, day turned into night stars that actually flickered and thrilled. I could just imagine witnessing a 3rd Degree here or better yet, being that 3rd Degree. We walked down stairs to the second floor where the major renovations would be taking place. 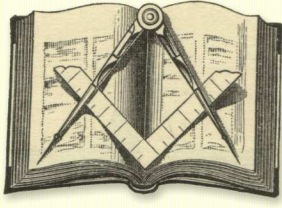

With Will gone, his wife Marion has single-handedly cared for her son Jim who has suffered with MS for 12 years now. Jim lives in a support home in Beaverton where Marion has moved so that she can be close by to assist with Jim's care. Jim is now confined to a wheelchair and has lost much of his mobility and speech.



In the fall of 2010, Jim decided that he needed to have the ground-breaking surgical procedure known as CCSVI (Chronic Cerebrospinal Venous Insufficiency), with the knowledge that anything could happen but without it his future was bleak. The operation took place in Rhode Island, USA on Dec. 26, 2010. The results of the surgery have been encouraging - he has movement in his hands, can sit straight in his chair now, his speech is improved and his hands and feet have circulation and are warm for the first time in years. He still needs more surgery. Unfortunately, the cost to the family for the first surgery was in



excess of \$10,000.00. That expense along with the cost of ongoing care (very little of which is covered through OHIP and the MOH) has put strain on the family's finances.

... by the Lighthouse Beam

The Trestle Board

In the French town of Caudebec, which stands on the Seine River, is the grave of one “Guillaume Letellier, master mason of the church, who had the conduct of the works for thirty years and more, and erected the choir and chapels.” On the gravestone of this long forgotten Masonic brother who was once a master builder is an inscribed drawing the plan of a building. It was the custom of builder in those days to have their tools engraved on their grave stones, just as knights and lords made use their heraldic devices. Brother Letellier chose to be remembered as one who made designs for buildings and therefore selected a building plan for his own during remembrances.



We do not need to be told how important in the work of Operative Masons was the making of a plan for a building. “What has the Master on his trestle board?” was a question often asked with keenest interest by the workman. And because of this importance, the trestle board, which represented the whole labour of making plans, came to be used as a symbol, just as we found Brother Letellier using it as a symbol his own life’s work. When Masons ceased to be Operative Masons, and turned their attention to the building of men in fraternal life, they retained the trestle board as a symbol.

The trestle board in Speculative Masonry is a symbol of that which we call an ideal. One should not be frightened by the use of this word. It does not refer to something visionary, or far away, or, as our slang expression has it, “highbrow.” Quite the contrary!

Before we go on a journey, we plan our travels, our plane or railway connections, our stopovers, and our destination. Before we undertake to erect a building, we are so careful to have a plan that often we pay an expert to make one for us. It would be equally wise if each of us were to have a plan similarly for his own life. A plan for one’s life is what we mean by an ideal. It is a plan for doing things.

Also, an ideal is a plan for improving actual conditions. If our lodge room were too small, or is badly ventilated, or inadequately lighted, or the members quarrel among themselves we might feel very unhappy because of such conditions: and some of us might put our heads together in an effort to better conditions. We would say, “Let us do this, and that, and the other thing, so that we can be happier in our lodge work.” Such a plan for bettering unsatisfactory conditions would be an ideal. It is something that we would draw, to speak figuratively, on the trestle board of our lodge. Such an effort to better actual conditions would not be “highbrow”; on the contrary, it would recommend itself to men of sense and sagacity.

We Masons believe that condition could be improved in our human world. We are too busy to dream impossible dreams about mankind: we are too practical to wish to waste time and energy on unattainable aims. We do not try the fantastical. But we know there are some things to be improved by plain common sense efforts, and we are leagued together and solemnly sworn to assist in such endeavours. This program for improving conditions among men is what we mean by the Masonic ideal; it is what the Fraternity has drawn upon its trestle board.



For instance, we Masons believe that much of the unhappiness in the world is due to ignorance, and we believe that if all men were well educated they would be happier than they are. We Masons, therefore, wish to do all we can to uphold and improve the whole public school system, and to try to make it possible for all the children of all the people to have all the enlightenment that is possible under the circumstances. Brethren, let us each one as individual Masons put that down on our own private trestle board.

Another example. Those of us who are acquainted with any community know that men and women very seldom live as happily with each other as well as might be. We are all bound up together. We are compelled to live in neighbourhoods. We must live together whether we choose it or not. Is it not wise, then, for us to learn how to live happily together? The effort to bring men and women into harmony with each other is the great aim of Brotherhood, and this practical, common sense, hard-headed effort to organize human neighbourhoods into human happiness, that is one of the great purposes of our Fraternity. It is on our trestle board.

A final example. Nations, like individuals and families, are also compelled to live together: there is no escape from that! But unfortunately, nations have not as yet learned how to live happily together. Ever so often they go to war, and then men and women suffer the most terrible unhappiness known to our race. How can we eliminate war and do away with national antagonisms is a difficult problem; the ways and means cannot be discussed here. But we men, we Masons, know that it can be done, and we are dedicated to the effort to do it. How to bring nations to live happily together; that also is on our trestle board.

None of these things are impossible dreams. The more experience and wisdom and common sense a man has, the more hard-headed he is, the more will he wish these things to be. They, and the other plans we have for improving conditions, will give us more prosperity, more money, more health, and more happiness. It is to such an ideal that Masonry is dedicated. Brethren, let us ourselves become dedicated also. Let us make such an ideal the symbol of our lives, just as did the good Master Mason, Brother Letellier, long ago!
